

Alpharetta High School Intermediate Mixed Chorus

Intermediate Mixed Chorus provides students with the opportunity to experience the art of choral music through the study and performance of a wide variety of music literature. The focus is on the development of vocal technique and music reading skills. Each student is expected to turn in written assignments on schedule, usually 1 or 2 per week. Students are to practice at home on a regular basis to be prepared for class. In class, students are expected to have their materials with them at each rehearsal. They are to take notes and mark the music to aid them in their home practice.

Materials: A 3-ring binder containing *Materials for Music Reading*, choral sheet music, and a pencil.

- Rhythm and meter
- Music reading
- Aural training skills
- Harmony
- Diction
- Interpretive elements
- Music as an expression of Culture
- Choreography
- Performance skills

Special Considerations:

Since the requirements for this class go beyond time spent in school, much self-discipline must be practiced in planning ahead for performances. (A schedule is available on our website, www.ahschorus.org.) In the event that conflicts arise, they will be handled on an individual basis. All students are expected to be at all performances for their group. Students with excused absences from performances will be expected to complete special projects.

If students are absent from class, they have the opportunity to make up any work in accordance with the student handbook. Students may request an extension due to special circumstances. Late assignments that are not excused will be accepted, although penalty points will be deducted, 10 per day, 50 maximum.

Extra credit may be earned through attendance at professional or school music programs. For each performance attended, a program should be submitted with a one-page critique within one

week. A maximum of ten quiz points may be earned for each. Participation in choral workshops, All-State Chorus auditions and performances, solo and ensemble festivals will also earn extra credit.

Students are encouraged to schedule help sessions or extra rehearsals on an individual basis at any time.

Conferences may be scheduled by appointment.

Detailed information about policies and procedures is contained in the Alpharetta HS Chorus Handbook, which is also on the website. Students in danger of failing may elect to improve this grade by initiating recovery work in accordance with Fulton County Policy.

AHS Plagiarism Statement: A particular kind of honor code violation occurs with plagiarism. Plagiarism is defined as the use of another's words or ideas and the presentation of them as though they are entirely one's own. Acts of plagiarism include but are not limited to using words or ideas from a published source without proper documentation; using the work of another student (e.g., copying another student's homework, composition or project); using excessive editing suggestions of another student, teacher, parent, or paid editor. Plagiarism on any project or paper at Alpharetta High School will result in a zero for the assignment, two days of Saturday school, and an Honor Code Violation. Unless directly stipulated by the teacher, collaboration on written work is not acceptable. Students who willingly provide other students with access to their work are in violation of the Alpharetta High School Honor Code. From time to time, students will be required to register with and post assignments to the Fulton County approved plagiarism detection site, turnitin.com. Should the teacher require posting the particular assignment to turnitin.com, the assignment must have been posted to the website prior to the time the assignment is collected in class or the assignment will be considered late.
